Board of Selectmen Joint Meeting Minutes February 27, 2020

I. Call to Order by Chairman

The February 27, 2020 joint meeting of the Norton Board of Selectmen with the Finance Committee and School committee was held in the Norton Middle School Library and was called to order at 7:28 P.M., by Ms. Kathleen Stern, Chair of the School Committee, Board of Selectmen member(s) present: Mr. Bradford K. Bramwell, Mr. Michael Flaherty, Mr. John Conway, Ms. Mary T. Steele, and Ms. Renee Deley. Also in attendance: Mr. Michael D. Yunits, Town Manager.

School Committee Members: Ms. Kathleen Stern, Ms. Sheri Cohen, Mrs. Carolyn Gallagher, Mr. Deniz Savas, and Mr. Daniel Sheedy. Also in attendance: Dr. Joseph Baeta. Superintendent of Schools, and Mr. Matthew Wells, School Business Administrator.

Finance Committee Members: Mr. William Rotondi, Mr. Stephen Evans, Ms. Aimee Sawyer, Mr. Michael Fiore, Ms. Paula Daniels, Mr. Aaron Smith, Mr. Peter Carignan, and Mr. Walter Eykel.

IT. Use of School Educational Facilities - Dr. Baeta

Dr. Baeta opened the presentation of the use of school educational facilities by saying that this is an ongoing issue that "at best irritates him." He said this irritates him because his integrity is being questioned by certain members of boards and elected officials. He commented that to be "less than irate" is where he is at. Dr. Baeta then moved on to discussing the L.G. Nourse Elementary School stating that the classroom sizes range from 4 to 26 students. He pointed out that one of the classrooms is being used as a conference room, which will become a general education classroom next year because of increases in class sizes in kindergarten and third grade. He explained that there are special subject areas, the library, general education classrooms, support services, the gym, and cafeteria. Dr. Baeta stated that it would be extremely difficult to consolidate classrooms, especially classrooms of 26 students, because they would end up with classroom sizes of 30 students. Ms. Deley asked what the State recommends for classroom sizes for kindergarten through third grade. Dr. Baeta answered that there is no official recommendation, but the ideal for kindergarten through first grade is 20 students or less.

Dr. Baeta moved on to the J.C. Solmonese Elementary School. Dr. Baeta informed the Board that a new READS Collaborative classroom was added; he said that they are in their 5th year of the READS Collaborative, which is available at the JCS, Middle School, High School and the Yelle School. He advised that there are 3 students that are Norton residents that are part of the approximately 45 READS students that are in the district. The School Superintendent explained that the South Shore READS collaborative is the deaf and hard of hearing specialized program for the entire area. The JCS is comprised of classrooms (some of which

show as one open space classroom, but actually has two classes) including READS classrooms, specialized classrooms, special education classrooms, a cafeteria, and a gymnasium. In summary, the JCS has five classrooms, three regular sized classrooms, one small classroom, and one empty classroom that is used as a conference room. Dr. Baeta advised that classroom sizes vary from 4 to 25 students at the JCS. On the second floor are special subjects, classrooms, open space classrooms, and the library.

He stated that the Henri A. Yelle Elementary School (HAY) School would be the last school he would recommend closing because it gives them the most flexibility due to its size. The school includes classrooms, a conference room, business office with several administrative staff, the Superintendent's Office, two secretarial spaces, PBS Director office space, IT Director office at the front, guidance offices, bathrooms, library, the gymnasium, music room, etc. On the second floor is more general education classrooms and on the third floor is a small READS classroom, special subjects, general education classrooms that support special education as well, another READS classroom, and a copy room. He explained that these classes are 3 to 25 students.

Lastly, Dr. Baeta described Middle School, where classes vary from 2 to 22 students. Dr. Baeta did an overview of the Middle School layout, including two BICO classrooms. He mentioned that a couple of computer rooms were converted to classrooms. He advised that the BICO collaborative consists of 18 communities and that 8 specialized classrooms were added in the last 7 years (this would be either the 21st or 22nd specialized classroom). The Superintendent of Schools informed the Board that they were going to have to completely reorganize the Middle School in order to add another specialized classroom. Lastly, the third floor includes 3 READS classrooms with the rest being general education classrooms. In summary, Dr. Baeta gave the following bullet points:

LGN:

one classroom that has been turned into a conference room, which will be changed next year;

JCS:

- small classroom;
- empty classroom;
- READS classroom(s)

HAY:

- 3 READS classrooms;
- Conference room;
- Superintendent's Office;

Middle School:

- 2 READS classrooms;
- 2 BICOS classrooms;
- 1 empty classroom that will become the special education classroom.

Dr. Baeta advised that he did not include anything regarding the High School because they are already sharing space there and doesn't seem to be an area of concern.

Dr. Baeta stated that enrollment is known as of October 1st. He provided the following figures:

District enrollment: 2,290

Out of District: 46 School Choice: 138

READS: 43 Total: 2,517

Mr. Fiore pointed out to Dr. Baeta that he gave a summary of occupancy, but not the hours the schools and rooms are used. Dr. Baeta gave a summary of classroom sharing.

Ms. Deley asked how the School Department does redistricting and/or decide when it is needed, providing the example of the LGN having more students than JCS. Dr. Baeta explained that rather than shifting students around he shifts teachers from schools based on enrollment needs, noting that the LGN is built as a perfect elementary school with pods. He also discussed the special education classrooms that need to be taken into account during redistricting. Dr. Baeta explained that the classroom sizes at the elementary schools are the most difficult. Ms. Deley clarified that if say she was on the line of which school to go to, they would shift teachers where needed rather than move the student to a different school, which Dr. Baeta confirmed. Dr. Baeta said that the next step after shifting teachers is that they would offer certain students the option to choose. He also spoke of downstream impacts such as school start times, professional development, and bussing needs that are considered as part of the process.

Ms. Daniels asked in regards to school capacity if they will need more space due to Special Education and the specialized classrooms. Dr. Baeta stated that just yesterday he received an e-mail from the Board of Directors from BICO looking for more space because a number of the 18 school districts including Norton are sending students to the Collaborative.

Mr. Bramwell asked with the READS collaborative and BICO students if they have the flexibility to move them to different schools. Dr. Baeta said they have to keep within an age group of at least 48 months.

Mr. Yunits reiterated what Dr. Baeta said that 20 students per classroom is the optimum number and asked how many classrooms are below 20 students and how many are above 20. Dr. Baeta said he did not have the figures in front of him and deferred to the handouts and spoke to them (LGN has 10 of 12 classes over 20; HAY 15 of 16 general classrooms over 20), noting school choice may need to be limited due to the class sizes. He stated that most of the classrooms have 20 students,

Ms. Steele asked if they have any international students. Dr. Baeta said they have one from Mexico, and he is living with his aunt and is paying international tuition. Ms. Steele asked if they have more international students how would that be accounted for. He answered that it would first go in the tuition revolving account (\$12,200 grades and \$14,200 to take the MCAS)

test). He added that if a Norton resident accepts an international student, they will be collecting tuition and enrollment fees of \$11,400 from the Commonwealth of MA. Lastly, Dr. Baeta informed the boards and committees that they accepted their first Chinese student that day.

Ms. Cohen pointed out that it took a tremendous amount of work to collect and present the data provided. She stated that they had to do all of this because there was an article submitted last Fall by a former Selectman. Ms. Cohen said that the article was not moved on town meeting floor, but they were still asked to go through this exercise. She stated that this same person has also submitted three public records requests of the schools questioning how and why they spend money in the School Department. Ms. Cohen commented that she doesn't know how this person could be an impartial moderator, but that is for the voters to decide.

Ms. Deley replied that she wanted to make a statement to Ms. Cohen's commentary and some of Dr. Baeta's "unnecessary commentary" from the beginning of the meeting. Ms. Deley pointed out this was intentionally not moved on town meeting floor because both the Board of Selectmen and Finance Committee spoke to the petitioner stating that they would rather not spend the \$45,000.00. She also referenced that part of the petitioned article was looking for the annual operational costs for the school buildings, but they also asked for the costs of the town buildings as well, which was not provided in the material given to them. Mr. Yunits said that they were collecting the town costs as part of the RFQ and Mr. Savas said each cost is a line item in their budget and Dr. Baeta indicated they presented this information recently to the Finance Committee.

Dr. Baeta questioned if the Board has to move or not move all articles. Ms. Steele answered that because it was a petitioned article, it had to be on the warrant. Mr. Yunits stated that the article was petitioned and you have to add it and you cannot change any of the language. Dr. Baeta questioned if that meant that anyone could file petitioned articles, which Ms. Steele and Ms. Deley confirmed that yes anyone could file a number of petitioned articles and they would have to go on the warrant. Ms. Deley admitted that the process and communication from this article could have been better. Dr. Baeta expressed that the way the article was written it appeared that he was being asked to answer to town meeting, which he doesn't. He further emphasized that he does not answer to the Town Manager nor the Board of Selectmen and that he only answers to the five members of the School Committee. Dr. Baeta retorted that there were "interesting signatures" on that petitioned article too. Ms. Deley replied to Dr. Baeta that was an inappropriate comment to make.

Mr. Paul Wanamaker asked if this was even ethical or appropriate for someone to make comments and attacks about how an individual running for an elected position would perform in that office if they are elected, especially when that individual isn't even present at the meeting. Ms. Cohen expressed that she is a resident and she can say what she wants. Mr. Wanamaker responded that at a previous Selectmen's meeting, someone who was being spoken about that wasn't present was immediately shut down. He reiterated that it seemed inappropriate for someone to comment on how that individual would perform if they were elected into that position when the person is not present.

III. FY21 Budget Discussion.

Mr. Yunits stated that he has been working with Dr. Baeta, Mr. Wells, and Mr. James Puello, the Town Accountant, on the FY21 budget. The Town Manager provided cherry sheets to all members and explained that there are two parts to the cherry sheets: receipts and assessments. Mr. Yunits informed the boards and committees that the receipt increased by \$343,886.00. He pointed out that \$152,609.00 shown on the sheet needed to be removed because that money goes to the schools. Mr. Yunits added that the \$1,232.00 increase shown goes to the Library. So, with these figures removed, the total available for appropriation increases \$190,045.00, the total charges increased \$84,235.00, and the total available funds comes to \$105,810.00.

The Town Manager referred to another handout provided showing a 3% increase for general government, the School Department, and Southeastern Regional just to give an idea of what those figures would look like. Mr. Yunits stated that they are still waiting on the health insurance figure for "Fixed and Shared" and the Water/Sewer reimbursement numbers.

Dr. Baeta indicated the school budget would be finalized this week.

Mr. Sheedy asked in regards to 40B housing if there are any other proposals before the Town. Mr. Yunits stated that there is a friendly 40B be proposed next to McDonald's that the Board of Selectmen voted to support. He added that the Town needs 82 more units to be at the 10% threshold for 40B's. Once the Town reaches 10%, no one else would be able to come in for a 40B. The Town Manager said where CrossFit is now, there is another 40B proposal for potentially 90 units. Mr. Yunits explained that they haven't met with them yet, but they are doing a site walk tomorrow. Mr. Sheedy asked about the Blue Star Business Park. Mr. Yunits replied that there are two buildings going up and that T-Mobile is looking to expand 30,000 sq. ft., which Condyne came in to look at.

Ms. Aimee Sawyer asked where the stagnant 40B's in town stand. Mr. Yunits explained that when the 40B is approved, they are on the books for 2 years and go towards the affordable count. After that, they don't count, but the State has the ability to grant extensions and then these don't count towards the quota. Mr. Yunits informed everyone that the 40B located at Island Brook on Route 123 was appealing the Conservation Commission's decision. Ms. Sawyer asked if say the 100 units go in and then the 40B at Turtle Crossing wanted to move forward if the State has to allow them to move forward. Mr. Yunits answered that they do because they are grandfathered in. Mr. Rotondi asked how many of these situations exist. Mr. Yunits said he would have to look into it.

IV. <u>Update on RFQ for Energy Management Services – School Committee.</u>

Mr. Yunits asked Mr. Wells to explain what is going on. Mr. Wells stated that the RFQ was approved and they advertised yesterday. He informed everyone that they have had five firms request the bid document and one reposting company. Mr. Wells mentioned that they are in the testing period now and they have a building tour scheduled for the 4th [of March] starting at 11:00 A.M. and going until 5/5:30 P.M.

Mr. Yunits said that the Town is going through the process of becoming a "green community" and asked how this money would figure in. Mr. Wells replied that this would be a part of the Chapter 25 process for the RFQ for energy management and all of the savings would be pulled together on that project.

Dr. Baeta mentioned that at the last Capital Committee meeting he stated that there would be a joint effort to figure out the utilities and other costs. He pointed out that if the Town goes forward with the RFQ, the Town would only receive a bill if it decided to not go forward with the proposals that were presented. Mr. Wells clarified that they can't build a new building under Chapter 25. Dr. Baeta stated that it is also important to have all of the buildings included because once you start the process, if you forget a building you cannot add it in.

V. Town Meeting Articles Overview.

Mr. Yunits reminded everyone that they do not know which way the buildings are going and that there are 5 draft articles on the warrant. The articles are for the following:

- 1. A town hall/senior center;
- 2. A town hall/senior center/sports fields;
- 3. Purchase of land for a town hall;
- 4. Purchase of land for a senior center; and
- 5. Purchase land for a town hall and senior center.

Mr. Sheedy asked if they are changing procedures as far as getting information out to the public unlike the last town meeting. Mr. Yunits stated that they have had that discussion with the Finance Committee and the Planning Board. Mr. Yunits added that the Planning Board is going to hold an informational session to explain the Planning articles so people can come in and ask questions.

VI. Adjournment

MOTION was made by Mr. Harrigan to adjourn the joint meeting at 9:20 P.M. Seconded by Mr. Sheedy. Vote: Unanimous. MOTION CARRIES.
