3-How can I stay involved in Town matters and ensure my voice is heard?

In the proposed Charter, there is even more opportunity for residents to be heard and participate than is provided in the current charter. In addition to a new, annual public hearing called by the Town Council President to receive input from voters on policy matters that they would like addressed, the proposed charter would maintain requirements for public hearings for zoning changes (as mandated by state law) as well as during the budget process. There are also numerous additional new opportunities for public participation as outlined in the below chart*.

And, most importantly, you will vote for every single member of the Town Council. They are responsible for making decisions that are in the best interest of the entire town and they're, ultimately, answerable to you. You can also vote them out (or even challenge their seat) if you're not happy with their performance.
